

The Student Government Association (SGA) survey was sent out to 5,570 undergraduate students from April 10 – May 10, 2012. This report documents findings of analyses conducted with data gathered from 1,340 (24% response rate) undergraduates at Azusa Pacific University (APU). This survey lends insight into a variety of aspects of students' experiences including the type of advising support they receive, their campus experience, their educational experience, and the social and spiritual support they receive.

The principal investigators were SGA President, Carter Posladek and SGA Vice President, Vincent Lehigh.

Due to the wide range of topics that were explored, and the relatively large number of analyses that were conducted, selected findings are presented below followed by a brief narrative on key findings. The Key findings are organized into four categories: Advising and Support; Campus Experience; Educational Experience; and Social and Spiritual Support. The reader is encouraged to consult the table and figures in this report for more detail regarding subjects of interest.

The following Figures and Tables include all responses from the survey participants and demographics are located from pages 26 – 30. Finally, open-ended comments begin on page 31.

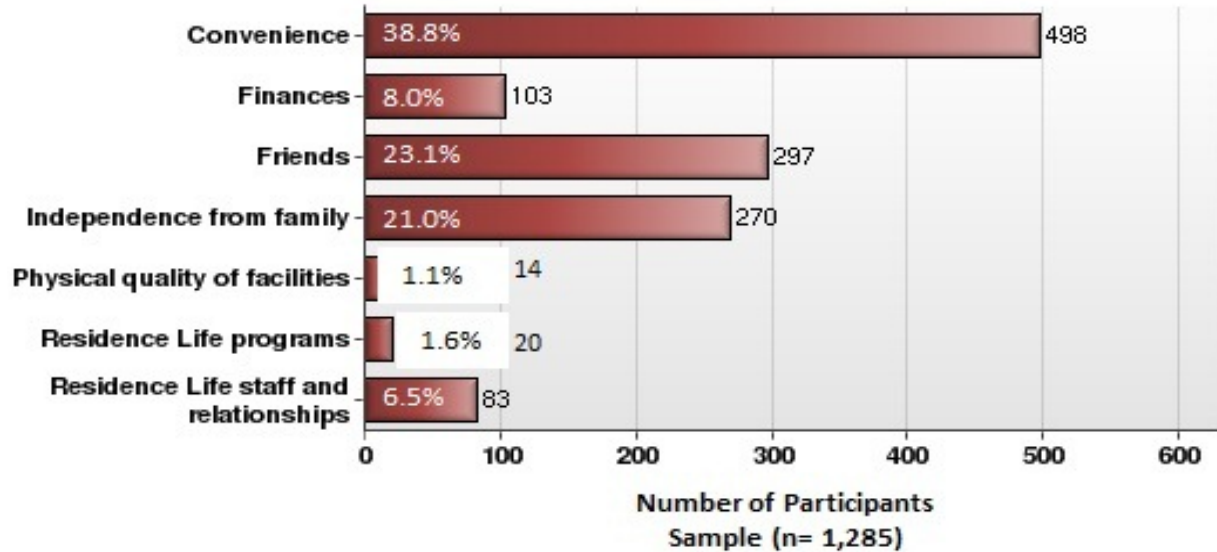


Figure 2. Survey Participants' number one reason for choosing to live off-campus.

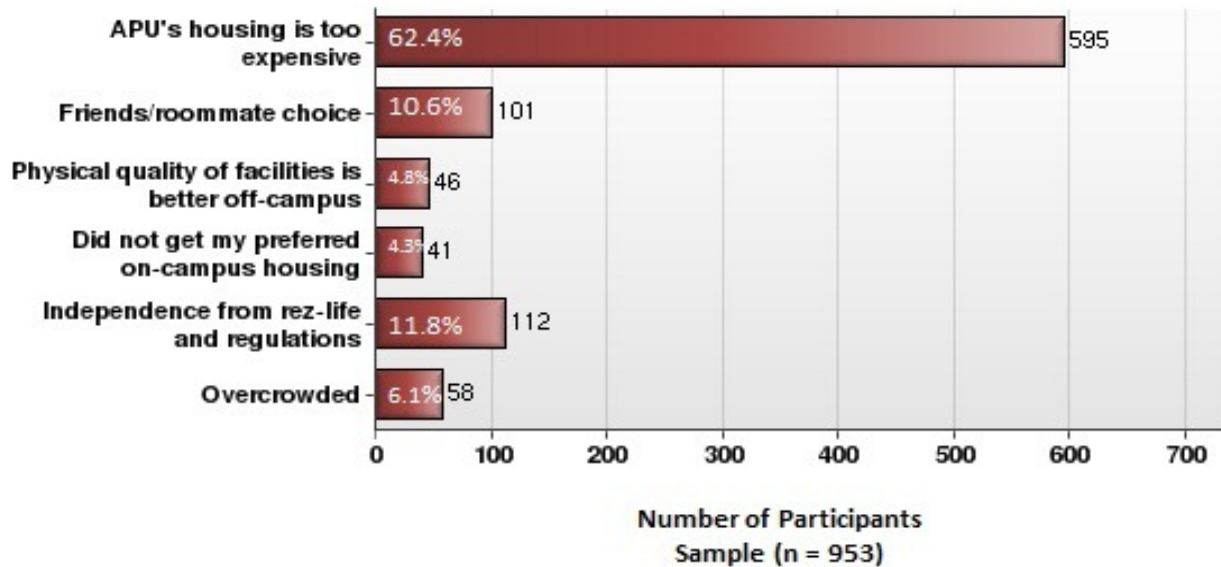


Figure 3. Survey Participants' number one reason for choosing to live at their permanent address.

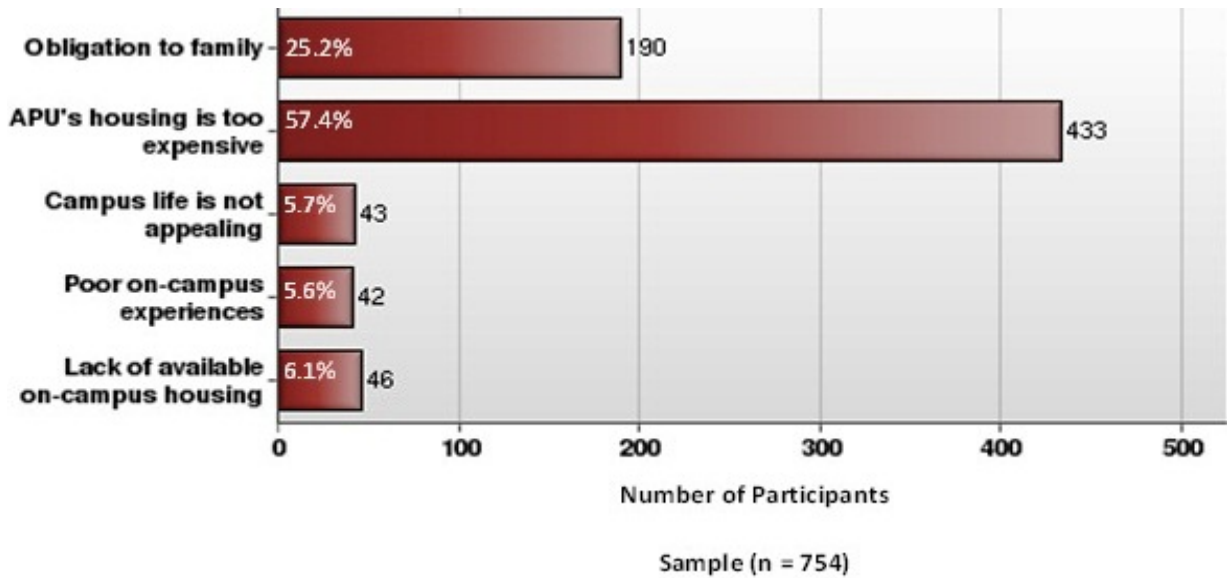


Figure 4. Survey participants' frequency of going home.

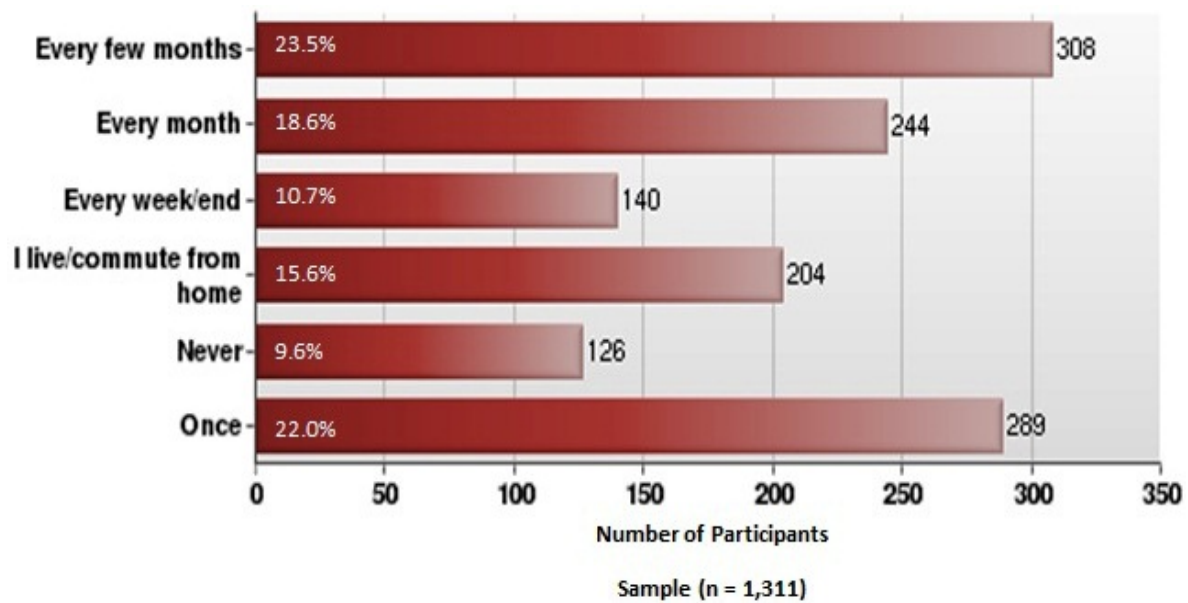


Figure 5. Survey Participants' number one reason of resources needed as a Commuter Student.

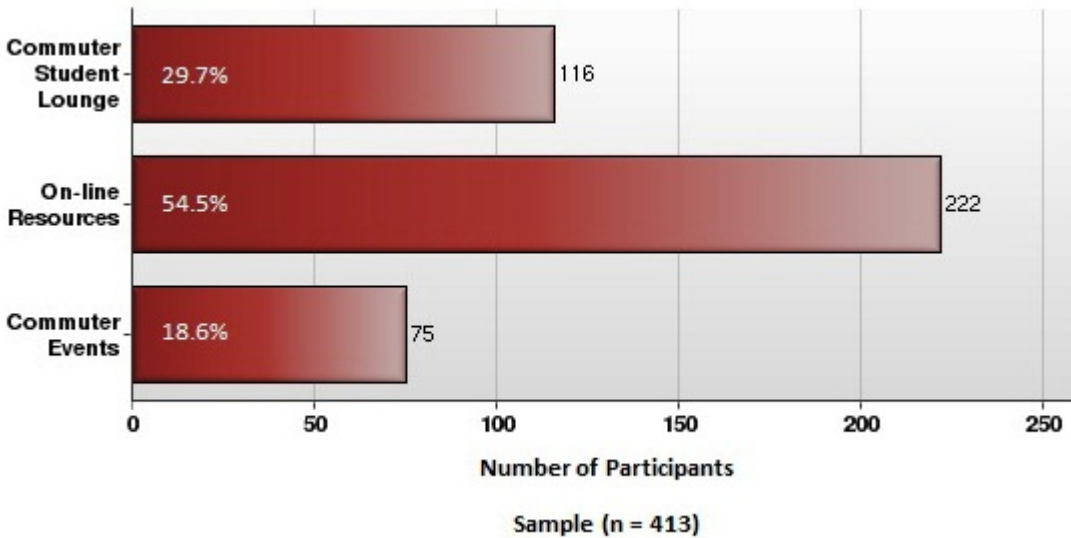

Figure 6. Survey Participants' preference of communication for APU campus and community events.

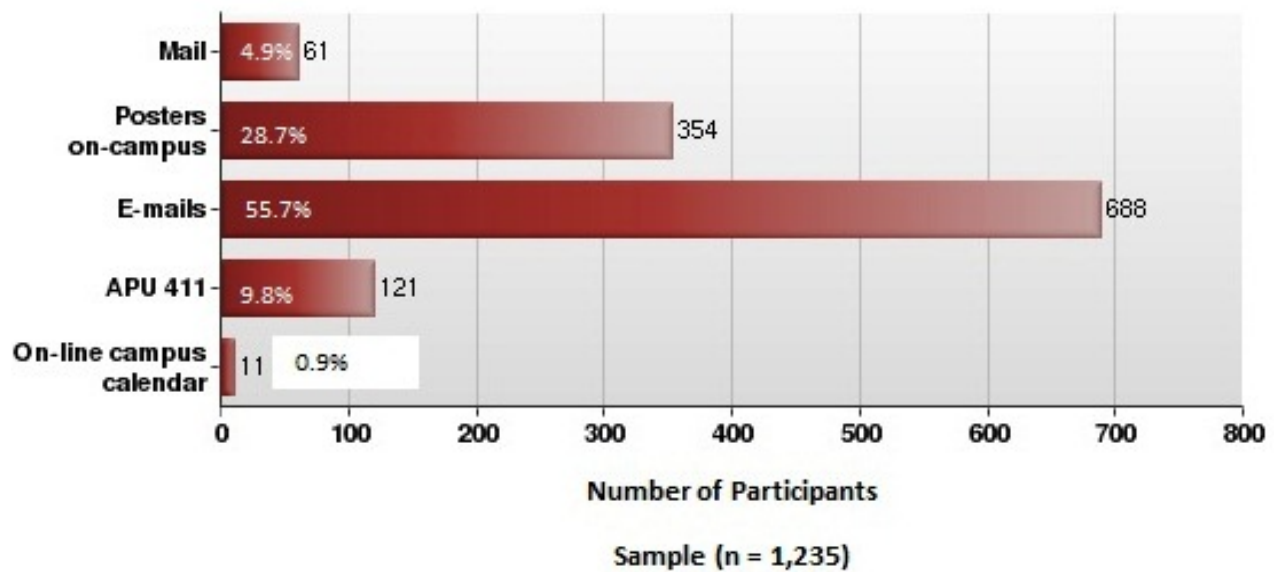


Figure 7. Survey Participants' living accommodations.

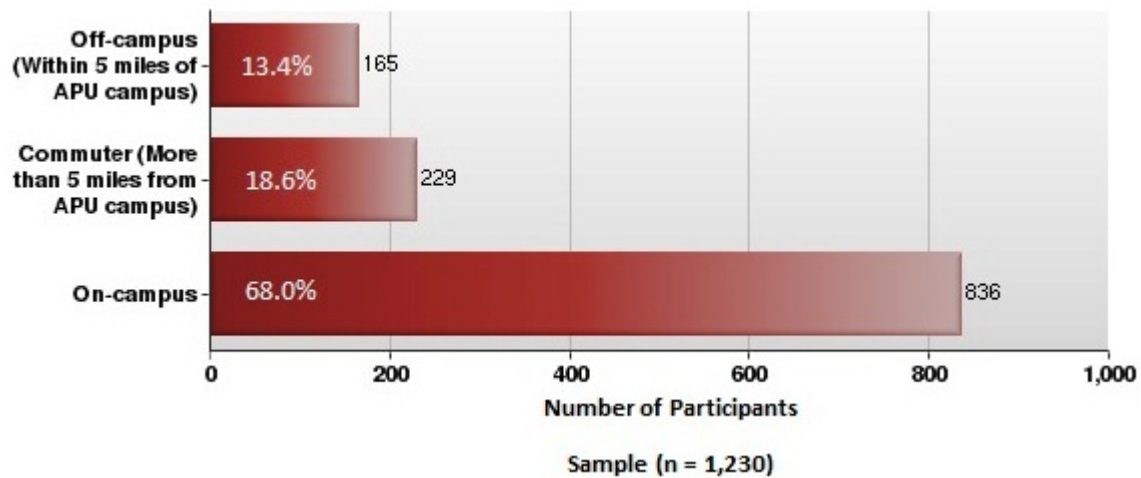


Figure 8. Survey Participants' employment status.

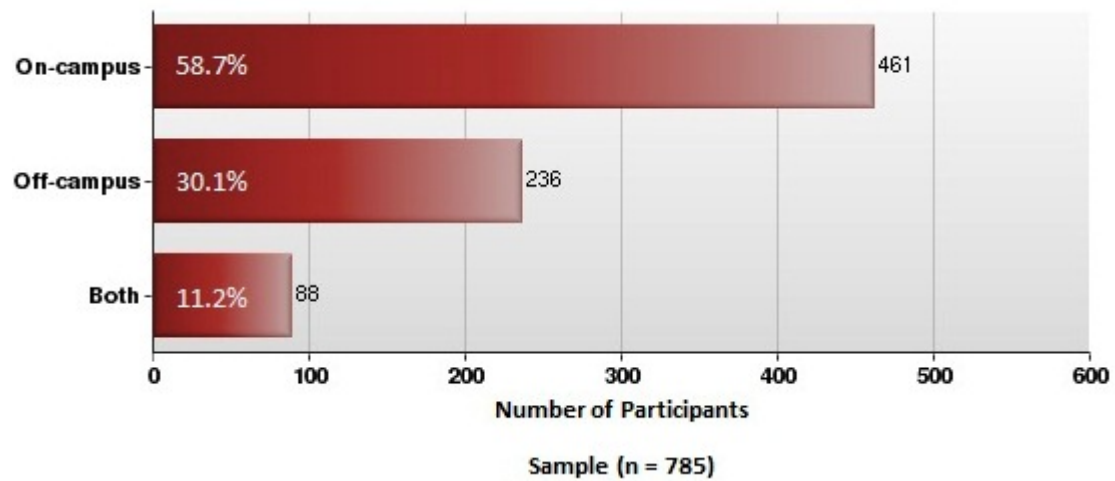


Figure 9. Survey Participants' time spent at work on a weekly basis.

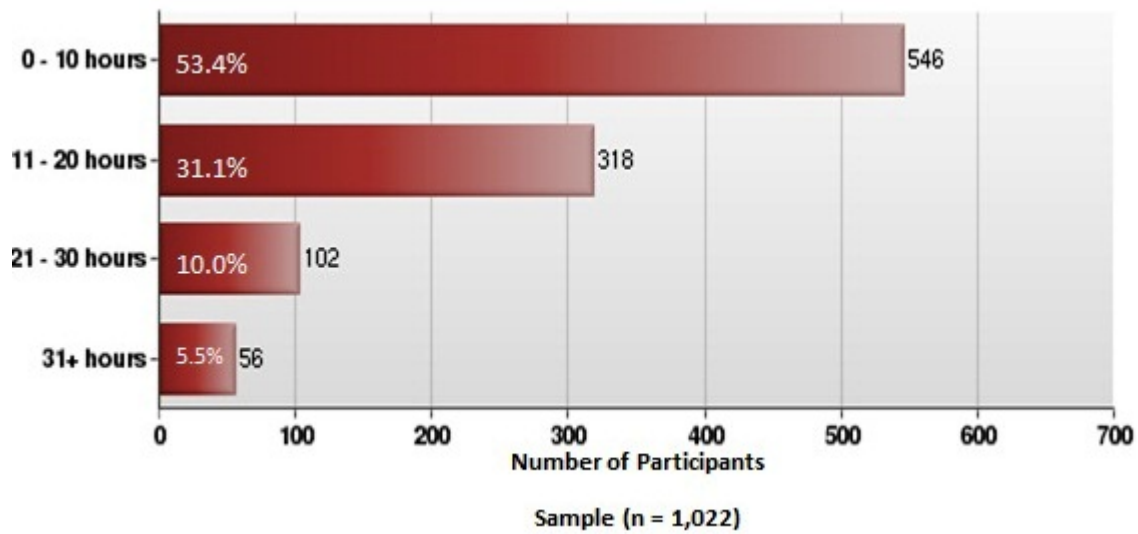


Figure 10. The majority of respondents were Psychology and Nursing majors.

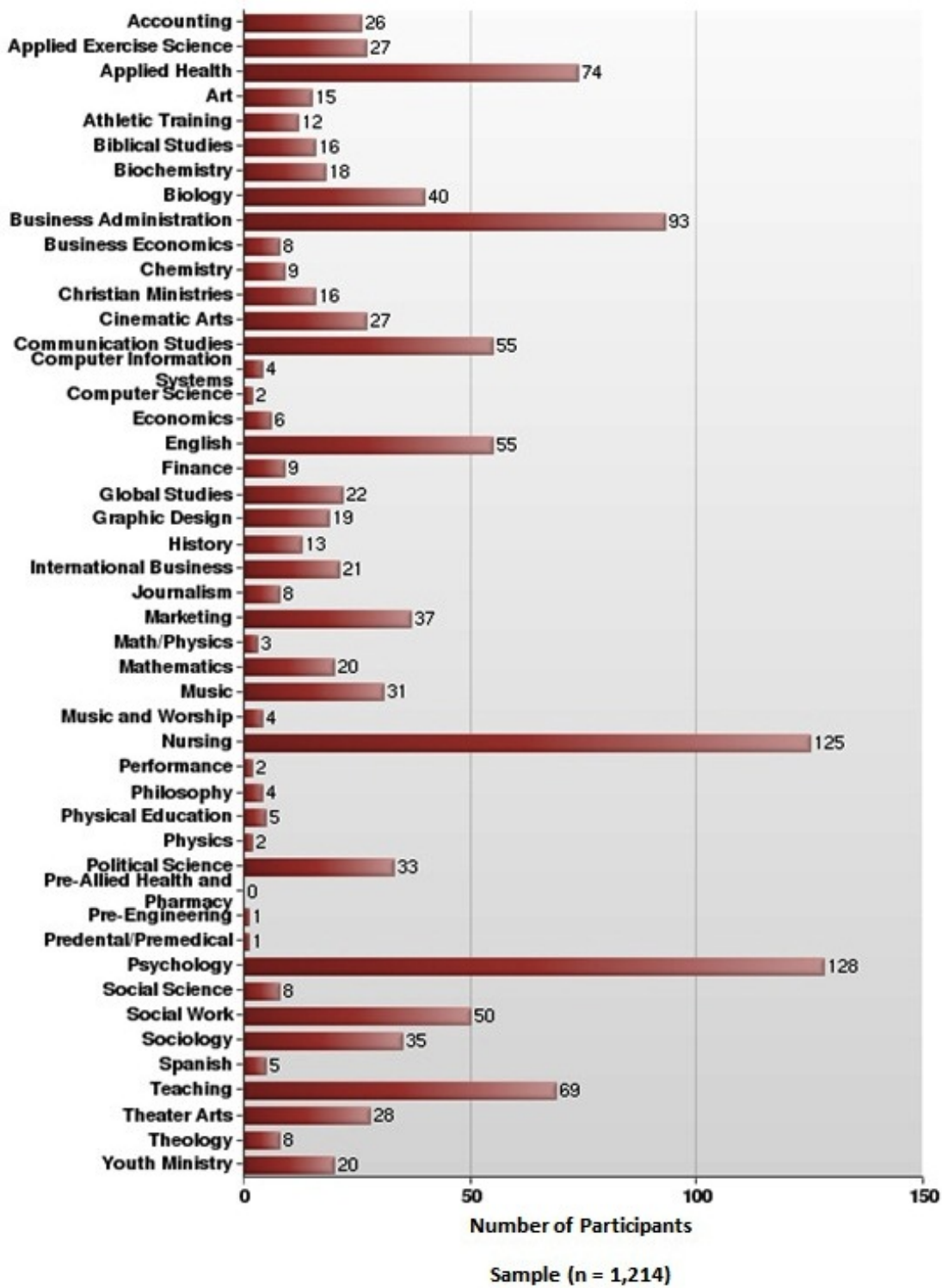


Figure 11. Survey Participants' year at APU.

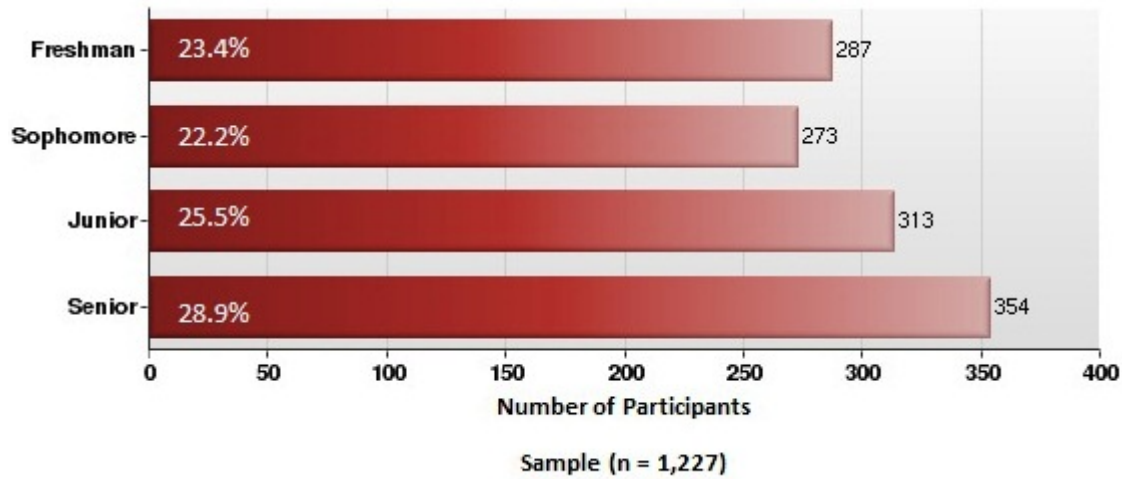


Figure 12. Survey Participants' indicated whether or not they are an International Student.

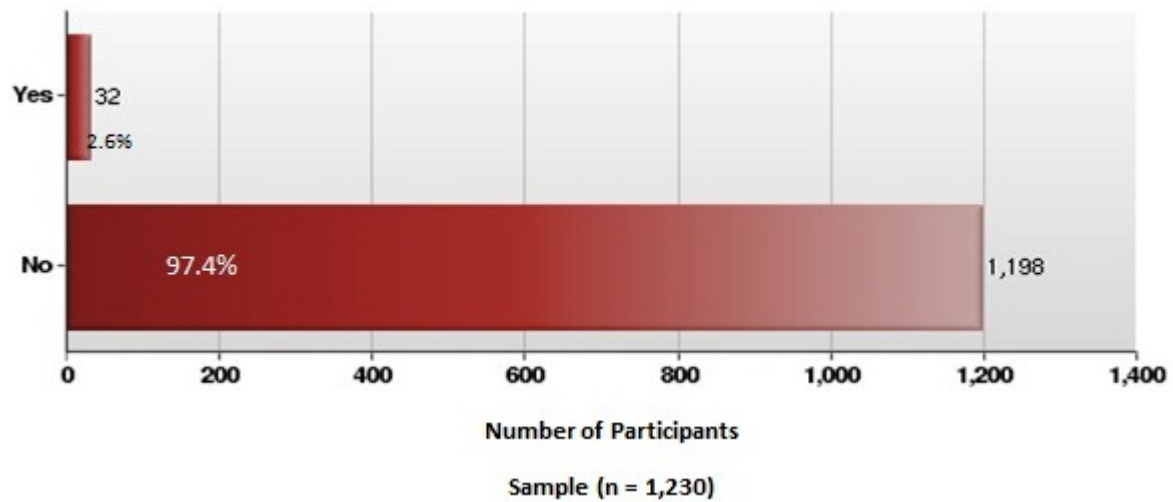


Figure 13. Survey Participants' Gender.

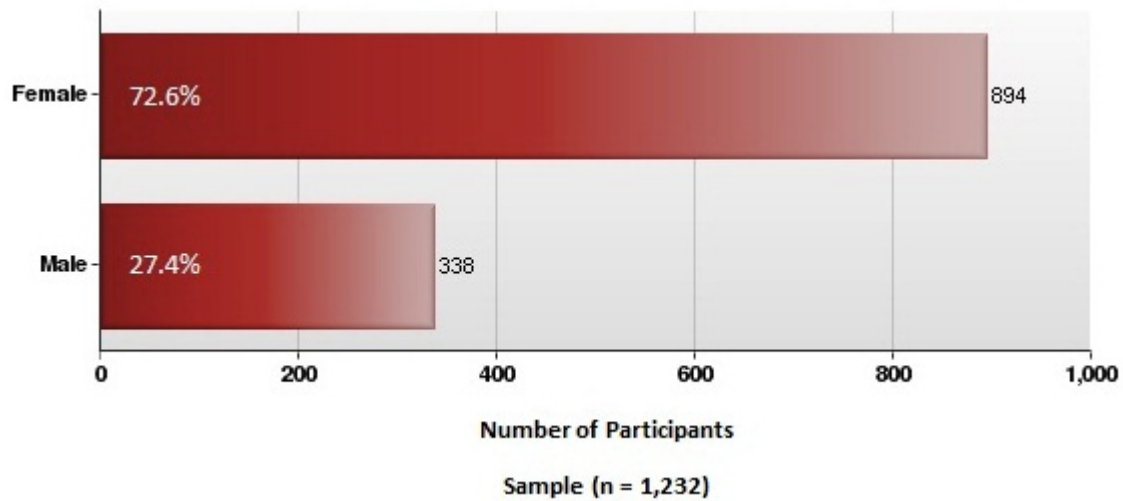
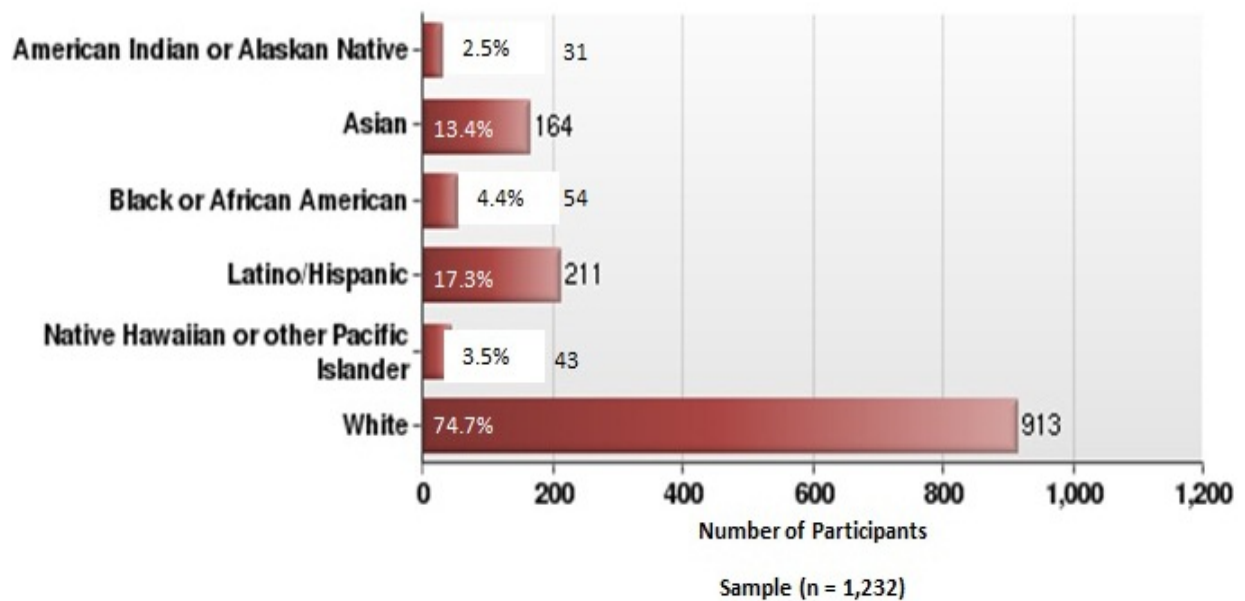


Figure 14. Survey Participants' Ethnicity/Race.

It is because of how RezLife responded to this situation that I am going to be living off campus from now on. I have zero respect for RezLife and those in positions of authority within RezLife.

Compared to the surrounding housing option APU charges way too much. For the price I pay at University Village (where I share one room with two other people) I could have my own room in an off campus apartment

Do not care for Res Life stigma and the way that many of the Res Life staff/students display an immature/fake persona

Every time I had a roommate, it was as though housing was playing a joke on me. These people were far from compatible. Awful experiences every time I tried to live on campus.

Everyone is too secular and closed circled. not a lot of options if you're not with the in crowd

Extremely different from roommate, to the point that we never clicked and I did not enjoy living with said roommate.

Girls and Guys having sex. I don't mind (it is their life decision anyway), but walking in on my roommate several times--NOT COOL!

Had a BIG falling out with a roommate who is now an ex-friend. Unfortunately that burned me on housing at APU as a whole. Often I would feel very alone and depressed in housing while living with uncomfortable roommate situations.

Have you seen the weekends here?

Having 3 girls live in a one-bedroom apartment and STILL pay \$2000 for one semester--plus utilities, is absolutely ridiculous. I don't have a car, but all my friends constantly had to park in far away and dangerous places at night because there wasn't room at the complex. The apartments were not designed to house as many people as they do.

Having a random roommate assigned

Horrible roommate situations back to back years. Sophomore year, one of my roommates took all her things and left without telling us and I came back to a half-empty apartment. Junior year I was constantly harassed and belittled by my roommates. They would ignore me and would not comply with our cleaning schedule which caused ants and filth. After meeting with my RA and RD multiple times, I had to leave after the first semester.

Housing is a horrible situation here, extremely overpriced compared to other areas of Azusa.

I always concern about the gates in University Village slam when close. Some of them actually got broken and I felt bad. It would have been better if there was a cushion between the door and the door frame so it won't slam.

I am a transfer student and had a horrible experience at my last college.

I am a transfer student and was paired with the worst possible match up possible. This semester was terrible; I was considering leaving the school because of it.

I came to APU as a transfer student and was placed in Alostia Place. Being in Alostia in the 2010-2011 year was a very unimpressive experience. I had a really hard time meeting people as that is already something that isn't easy for me. I did not appreciate being a "commuter" my very first year at APU. I felt like much less than a priority and were it not for my major and professors within the major, I would have left APU altogether.

I didn't get along with my roommate.

I didn't like the rules and everyone always being up in my business. I'd like a place to escape.

I don't live on campus because it is extremely overpriced and crowded for the actual quality of the apartments. Last year I had a mouse problem that facilities never came to fix and I had to pay 600+ utilities to share a tiny bedroom with two other girls. In addition, I found the rules to be too inflexible. My brother and sister came to visit me but were forbidden but my own brother was forbidden to stay overnight in my apartment due to his gender.

I don't live on campus.

I felt like my RA and RD intentionally interfered with my life because I did not participate in their events. I keep to myself and did not appreciate being punished for that.

I had a wonderful on campus experience. The only part I found upsetting was one of APU's housing policies. After requesting and receiving a triple room, by no one's fault, multiple third roommates fell through. The school then raised the price to a double room, but refused to remove the extra furniture. They stated that they had no other place to store the furniture and needed to keep my room available as a triple. At the semester my roommate and I were required to empty the extra furniture and a portion of the closet in case an additional person moved in. We were threatened with a fine if this was not done. It is an unacceptable and unfair policy to charge students for a double room and treat it as a storage facility. It is unacceptable to charge student for a double room and treat it as a double. I do not say these things because I am upset with the school as a whole. I am so thankful to be here and have loved this year. I am only trying to express what I believe is a policy that should be changed in inappropriate medium to do so.

I had back surgery my freshman year while living in Adams, on the 3rd floor. It was a hard transition for me, and I did not have a good experience with my RA in how she was handling my situation. I also did not feel as welcomed in my hall, and I was often too busy with schoolwork to partake in hall events. So, I decided to move off campus the next semester, but I moved back into the apartments sophomore year.

I had difficulty making friends even though I am a naturally outgoing person.

I have lived on campus all four years

I have lived on-campus for the past three years, and it has always been a positive experience.

I lived in H court, 3 bedrooms with no kitchen. The house itself was unsafe, unsanitary and very expensive. When the cost of living there, plus the mandatory meal plan because the lack of kitchen were all added together, I realized that I could get a much better living situation for that amount of money. Living in that small of a space in those conditions greatly affected my emotional health and academic performance.

I lived in the lobby rooms of Engstrom. That is a HORRIBLE place to live. You're in limbo, regarding community, and you hear every party.

I lived in the Transfer court during the fall of 2010. The first semester there was very depressing for me and I almost left APU because of it. Although I was entering as a Freshman, the credits I earned in high school technically made me a transfer student. Because of this, and despite my requests to room with other Freshmen, I was put in the transfer court. I really did not find anyone to connect with or any events to go to. Finally, I started trying as hard as I could to get moved into a freshman dorm. Once I moved in, I had a great year and decided to stay at APU.

I lived in the village and there were never enough parking spaces available for those living there. I would like to live on campus but APU does not provide enough housing for students and the housing office is very impersonal to students. I do not feel that APU even cares if I get housing or not.

I'm not sure how roommates are chosen because my roommates and I had nothing in common and it led to some problems.

I've been informed of many apartment break-ins...There should be more campus safety officers patrolling the housing areas and not so focused on whether or not I parked on top of the painted line...

In short, Resident Advisors did nothing, didn't help with any sense of 'community', and got stuck with bad roommates in a house that was falling apart.

Incompatibility with random roommate; preferences were not taken into account even with other available apartments

1. I feel medically comfortable with the Health Center, but financially frustrated. The Health Center has twice now messed up my bills, charging my account after I had paid in full with a check. I also find it frustrating that the HC does not apply insurance immediately but forces us to send in reimbursement requests. Even for services covered by our APU-issued insurance policy! The HC knows what is covered by our APU policy; surely they can read my record to find out I am asthmatic and not charge me for my flu vaccine, since the leaflets THEY provide say APU insurance covers flu vaccines for people with asthma... 2. My interaction with SFS last year was a disaster; I could never get my questions answered and the receptionist and counselors were perennially rude. This year has been much, much better. There are smiling faces at the front desk, and the people I've spoken to generally exude a willingness to help. Thank you!

Ability to relate is most themed at APU

A few times IMT would only be able to help me if I came into the office even though I wasn't able to go in. My problems were not resolved. Also, APU web filter is strict, filtering things that do not need to be, which get in the way of academic resources.

APU enforces the web filters much too strongly. I am an art major and my research is constantly being impeded by web blocks such as "pornography" and "explicit art" when nothing that I am researching falls under those categories. And we are all adults at this university, having the blocks of "explicit art" and "R-Rated" are absolutely ridiculous. I believe the university is over stepping their boundaries on this issue. But mostly, "explicit art" should not even be a category, and often times the computer misjudges what explicit art is anyway. I was doing research on a presentation about Van Gogh the other day, and websites kept coming up as "explicit art" when Van Gogh did nothing explicit. He was mainly a landscape artist with few portraits, and when there are people in his pieces they are fully clothed. I don't believe there is anything explicit about that.

APU has adequate resources in all of these areas. As far as the internet filter goes, it has not negatively impacted my academics.

APU Internet filter blocked an article on censorship. Can't get any more ironic or censored than that. PLEASE fix it! Only thing that should be blocked is porn.

APU web filter filters things that have to do with sociology as well. Who are they to block what I can and cannot see? Who determines what is right to look at?

APU web filter has never been an issue for me. I've always been able to get information that I need.

APU wireless really is horrible and not reliable. It forces me to utilize other sources to do my homework, even though I really need wireless. IMT takes a long time to respond to my needs.

As a nursing major, the internet filters make it almost impossible to look for research

At three in the morning when coming home from the library I have had to wait for campus safety for over thirty minutes. I am sorry but at three in the morning there are not that many people who need rides so I am not sure why it takes so long. This has happened on more than one occasion. Even if they are driving from Bowels then to the Village then to east to pick me up, that doesn't take thirty minutes.

Blocks some websites that I need for research

Cisco constantly logs out in the middle of research.

Every time I have gone to the health center sick, they tell me I need an appointment and turn me away.

Filters are good to block things like porn, but everything else? Come on! We are 18 19 20 21 22 you are not our parents!

Financial advisor has bungled my finances

Health center gets you in but does not do much. Web filter is terrible. I'm an adult. I don't need someone telling me what is and is not appropriate. If anything it makes my personal curiosity hindered to explore certain types of information and internet shopping. Financial services give me the run around all the time and it is extremely frustrating.

Health Center has been amazing; Katie Shubin has really showed care in helping me through things. Internet is on and off working especially during times I need it most, like Spring break I stayed to do homework and had to go to coffee shops to use the internet because it wasn't working here, APU filter has stopped me from being able to look up art webpages for my homework., IMT has been helpful when needed. Office of student financial services has been helpful depending on the person. The girl usually at the front desk has at times ignored me when I'm standing in front of her and has been rude when I try to talk to her. But Ray has been very helpful.

I am a nursing major and get blocked from websites due to the material on the sites.

I am glad our internet is now faster; however I have had some academic sites blocked.

I appreciate the resources available to us. I definitely appreciate the web filters and the level of protection they offer and I appreciate that IMT is willing to unblock certain pages that are not harmful and mistakenly blocked (such as a church site). Every question I've asked SFS has been answered in a timely and professional manner, and IMT has always been able to help me fix my computer needs. I would feel comfortable going to the Health Center if the need arose, but I have not had to go there for any illness.

I believe that the web filter is unreasonable and unnecessary. We are adults, and should not have to be monitored. Abuse by a few should not affect privileges of many.

I do most of my homework in the campus computer labs, and I can almost always find a computer to use.

I don't understand the cost involved in going to the health center...I'm afraid of hidden costs. Could use more macs and midi keyboards in more than just the midi lab. Hate the APU web filter; I feel like it really doesn't serve a good purpose. We are adults here, let's be treated as such. Also I wish there was exit loan counseling available in person.

I do not see the web filter as a problem.

I feel as though the staff working in the health center do not give accurate medical advice. I once went in to the health center very sick only to be told I had a cold. I continued to go back just to be put on more medications. I finally went to a doctor off campus and was diagnosed with pneumonia. I got so sick I missed weeks of school and fell very behind. There are countless stories such as this from many students who do not trust the health center.

I have been denied access to some academic sites because they are tasteless, when they are not. I cannot get resources for my media based major.

I haven't really gone to IMT

I have never actually visited the Health Center, but I would feel comfortable doing so. I've been able to effectively use the campus computing resources in order to complete assignments. I've never been blocked (impeded) by the computing resources. IMT seems to know how to fix problems involving computers and they seem to have a good level of expertise. I haven't had to ask many questions of the financial services office.

I have not been into the Office of Student Financial Services.

I have not had good experiences with the Health Center. They have misdiagnosed me more than once. The office of student financial services needs better communication between each other and other offices.

I have not used any of those services but the people in the Health Center and SFS are really sweet

I have used none of the above since I am attending a regional campus. I feel disconnected from ministry opportunities of the campus.

I heard from a few different people that when they receive shots the nurses did not know what they were doing.

IMT has consistently shown that they are incapable of doing their own jobs. I've tried to get academic websites

blocked multiple times and I've gotten no responses.

IMT has given me problems for quite a while. I am part of the laptop program and I feel that they do not have enough expertise to help me with my computer problems. I have gone to them many times for different computer issues and each time their answer was to reimage my machine.

IMT is a joke, and so is the internet filter. Give us kids a little freedom. We are adults, I think we can choose to watch shows with profanity in them or look at funny, offensive (yet harmless) jokes on the internet.

I never used the Health Center.

Internet is absolutely horrendous. The Web Filter is also one of the things that I dislike most about APU.

I research human-trafficking a lot and am involved with ministries that reach out to women in the sex industry. A lot of the ministry websites I try to access are blocked. Some of my friends from the ministries have shared their stories about being trafficked to journalists, who published them for online blogs (usually women/beauty tips kind of blogs) and the web filter wouldn't even let me access them! Super frustrating! IMT unblocked one of the sites because I emailed them about it... but I don't have time to email them about every single one! It definitely makes researching about human trafficking and things of that nature almost impossible!

I strongly disagree with IMT's filter impeding my academics. Even though it is annoying sometimes, it never blocks something that will further my academics. It is always unrelated matter. The office of financial services is not at all helpful in answering my questions unless I have exhausted all of my available loans and other resources I wish to avoid. Loans and loans and loans are the only answer they give to my questions.

It is annoying to have to log in to the internet every time I go from West to East or to my apartment.

It would be super helpful to have the Post Op open over breaks- especially if we have projects due the Monday night after spring break. Even if it was just opened all day Monday that would be better than not opening until 4.

I was trying to research a controversial topic for my Persuasive speech for my Public Communication class but APU blocked most of the websites I needed. I find it ridiculous that I have to go to Starbucks and access their internet to do my homework. I understand that APU is trying to maintain a "safe" environment on campus but students are going to access immoral things online whether there is a filter or not.

I wish there was a specified instruction about the policy related with the APU web filter provided for students. So people could understand why some sites are blocked and some are not.

Keep comp labs and libraries open later and earlier and 7 days a week

Many times when the nursing students have been told by the nursing program at the last minute that shots and immunizations are needed, the health center is unwilling to help, leaving the students to suffer and to pay extra to drive off campus to get shots. Many students do not live nearby and therefore cannot get last minute vaccinations anywhere else.

My financial aid counselor doesn't help very much

New web filter is annoying.

SFS has misquoted me and my wife about account balances at least 3 times, all to our detriment, since we have been at APU. For a residential campus, the APU Internet is mistakenly understood to be used solely for academics. That would only make sense if this was a commuter school. It is unreasonable to expect a campus population of this magnitude to not rely on the APU Internet for personal reasons as well as academic.

Stop blocking every single thing that is not rated PG. It hinders me from doing research on certain things for classes.

Stop blocking so many websites. I am paying for it, I should have full access. Many times it blocks school related websites...

Student Financial Services contains most the rudest employees that APU Staff has.

Student Financial Services don't explain anything or give me the whole truth when I try to get information. They give me one step at a time instead of a list of things that need to get done.

Take off the web filter. We're college adults not elementary children and if we want to buy a bathing suit off of victoriasecret.com it really isn't that big of a deal!

Thank you for the web filter, sincerely! I don't want that on my computer, even when it's on accident. I think it is necessary and reasonable

The APU web filter can be a bit ridiculous at time. I believe APU students are responsible adults who can decide for themselves what is and isn't appropriate for them on the internet.

The APU web filter is absolutely ridiculous.

The APU web filter NEEDS to be changed/abolished

The bills I receive from Student Financial Services are not always accurate and most of the time very difficult to read. I feel that I am being charged for things that I shouldn't be but because the record keeping is so poor there is no way to dispute it.

The filter blocks too many sites that are academic in nature (news, scholarly journals, etc.). IMT is generally unhelpful, takes too long, and EXTREMELY overpriced. They wanted to charge me \$150+ for a part that cost me \$4.56 on Amazon with free shipping and keep my laptop for three weeks. I was able to switch out the part myself in a few hours in my dorm by watching a YouTube video.

The filters on websites have caused problems for research for homework and other activities.

The health center can be crowded and the doctors are not as good and the web filter is ridiculous.. we're in college we should not have to be filtered on the internet I think we are old enough to control our own internet

The health center doesn't really do much beside tell you to go to a local hospital so instead of going there I tend to just go to the hospital

The Health Center does not answer all the health problems I have and I always eventually have to go to my personal doctor. ON campus wireless and computers are too slow and always impede my academics.

The Health Center does not provide the level of service that my health insurance will cover and makes me run around in circles many times in the past. The campus computing resources are very faulty and not at all acceptable for the amount of money each student is paying in tuition. The web filter has hindered many of my academics by blocking web sites that have no reason to be blocked. IMT always takes a long time to respond to my needs. Financial services always takes too long answering my questions and once never responded back to a need I had when I went into their office. I spent 30 minutes in their office trying to gain answers and it took them over a month to get answered.

The Health Center is always helpful and professional. I have gone there a few times and always felt cared for and like I received the medical attention I needed. The Wi-Fi on campus can be slow or unavailable which is frustrating, but I must say it has gotten much better since my freshman year (08-09). The APU web filter blocks many art websites required for research for my major, none of which are offensive to a Christian community. I always need to leave campus to write my papers and do research for my projects. IMT is lacking in professionalism and has blocked my internet access for allegedly peer-to-peer file sharing even though I was able to prove that I was at work (and not even on campus) during the incident, and there was no record of the site in my laptop's history. I have had other negative experiences, but merely use this incident as an example of my frustration (my other job is on-campus, where I work on my laptop and require internet access for my work, so I was unable to work on the day IMT blocked my internet). My advisor for the office of financial services does not return my phone calls or e-mails and discusses her own problems whenever I meet with her, which can be frustrating. She often tells me she doesn't know the answers to my questions and tells me to figure it all out myself. However the office itself is friendly and professional.

The health center is closed or already booked when you need them most. Between classes and work it's nearly impossible to schedule an appointment without missing class or work. They need to hire more staff so they can be

open more hours and/or open on weekends. IMT is frustrating and can take time to get things done. A student financial service has been helpful to me for the most part, but it takes a long time to get what I need.

The health center is helpful for walk-in appointments, but can seem busy if reserved by phone. Financial Aid has the answers I need, but there seems to be too many steps to approve the forms for aid.

The health center would not see me for several days when I had severe strep throat

The Internet could be better, and the web filter gets annoying. Sometimes I can't even shop online. I feel the students should be trusted more

The internet has logged me off of documents multiple times

The lady I spoke with in the Student Financial Services office was unfriendly and unhelpful. When I asked her questions, she gave me short, cold answers, and she didn't even answer my questions. I felt like I was bothering her by being there, so I just thanked her and left, but I didn't want to make her feel awkward by complaining or making an appointment with a different counselor. So, to this day, I still don't have my questions adequately answered.

The last 2 questions are not applicable: I've never needed IMT or met with financial services.

The office of student financial services has no idea what is going on with nursing summer start tuition, and I need to know the exact cost of things. It is unnerving that I hear different costs from them, than I hear from the nursing department. Also, it is unreasonable that they will not allow for a payment plan for the summer start nursing program. At least, this is the impression I have received so far.

The office of student financial services has also caused me a lot of problems and is incredibly disorganized. The APU web filter makes me feel like I am in elementary school, which is not what I am paying \$35,000/year for.

The Office of Student Financial Services is by far the worst department on campus. The receptionists are terribly rude, and the counselors don't seem to know what they are doing.

The office of student financial services is amazing! They are always helpful and friendly.

The overall quality of the internet access on campus is a hindrance to both school and free time activities.

The printers are not always reliable.

The quality of the health center seems to be rather low in comparison to Biola. There are barely any health supplies offered to students.

there should be another doctor in the health center

The web blocks on certain website are sometimes uncalled for... And not R rated when they say they are.

The web filter blocks unnecessary websites that prevent me from looking up appropriate websites or purchasing things I wish to buy. The Health Center does not prescribe any medications and has misdiagnosed my illness every time I have been there. They do not take seriously the medications needed to help students get better.

The web filter hasn't affected my academic work, but sometimes it categorizes sites as pornographic when they are not, which is frustrating.

The web filter is a little ridiculous. I understand blocking porn, but the filter is way too strict. I am glad I live off campus and don't have to put up with being treated like a child. And, on many occasions it has blocked legitimate websites and made research impossible on campus.

While the Financial Services had my answer, they made me work very hard to get it, when they could have written 2 words on my Hold. Instead I had to miss a class and chapel to find out that they didn't have my W-2.
